

Rosalia is working closely with our JUB engineers and the Department of Health Office of Safe Drinking Water to update our Small Water System Management Program (SWSMP). We are applying for preconstruction funding to improve our water system. The intended construction project will replace old and leaking water mains, service lines, valves and fire hydrants in high priority areas. Replacement of these portions of the water system will reduce water loss and improve water delivery to the homes and fire protection to the school. It will also upgrade the water system control telemetry, which will allow for more efficient control and monitoring of the system and prevent unintended overflows at the storage reservoirs, which has been a significant problem in the past. This project will address an additional need to reduce non-wastewater flows to the Town's sewer treatment facility. Water line leaks contribute to elevated groundwater levels, and groundwater subsequently makes its way into the sewer collection system and negatively impacts the treatment capacity of the wastewater treatment facility. The Washington State Department of Health has mandated that public water systems reduce water loss to less than 10% of their total use by 2017. Water losses in the past have amounted to over 30% of total water pumped. It is critical that we comply with this regulatory requirement, and it will provide a significant cost savings to the Town. The water mains being replaced are becoming increasingly difficult and expensive to keep in operable condition. It is critical that we replace them soon.

Whitman Ave. Street Project Update By: Nanette Konishi, Mayor

Thursday, July 20th, engineers, contractors and city personnel met to finalize plans for the South Whitman Street Project. At that time we were told that the expected start date was to be mid-August. Many considerations and complications have led to this start time, most of which are out of our (the town's) control. Because of the critical location of this project, it has been important for all entities involved to make every effort to accommodate the traffic needs of both the Rosalia School and the farm trucks traveling through town during harvest. We all appreciate the significance and importance of getting the trucks in and out of town safely and efficiently as well as the necessity for providing safe travel for students and faculty to and from the school during construction.

In order to remove all necessary material from the roadway (including 12" thick concrete slabs) and achieve the proper compaction for successful re-surfacing of the road, it is necessary to close down Whitman between 8th Street and the city limits for 10-14 days, detouring all traffic around from the south entrance/exit using Josephine starting where it curves around the school and empties onto Whitman Ave. This closure is expected to take place between August 15th and the first of September. Whitman is expected to be open to one-way traffic from that point to completion, including harvest trucks. During the 10-14 day complete closure, before school starts, Josephine will be the detour route for north and south bound traffic between 8th and the city limits. The large harvest trucks will use the North Rosalia entry/exit route. It is understood that this is a more difficult than the usual route, but it is considered workable and safe. I have been in conversation with Head of PNW, Bill Newbry, and we are working together to assure the safety for all traffic on 195 at that entrance/exit, including signage and possibly reduced speed limits during that period. Bill is making every effort to get the word out to all farmers about this short term inconvenience. This is an important project that has been a long time in the planning and is now ready for execution. We will all appreciate the finished product. Please give our construction crew a break, and understand that in spite of the inconveniences, they are just doing their jobs, and we will have a beautiful new street when it's completed.



You will need...

 \bullet 1 teaspoon of dried peppermint OR 1/4 cup chopped fresh peppermint


- 1 teaspoon of dried nettle leaf OR ¼ cup chopped fresh nettle leaf
- Honey and lemon to taste (optional)
- 8 ounces of fresh water

Directions

It doesn't get much simpler than this recipe! Place the nettle and peppermint in a mug and cover with boiling water. Steep them for 10-15 minutes, strain; add honey to taste, and drink 2 times daily as needed for allergy relief.



Chicken Watermelon Tacos



- 4 tomatillos, husked and rinsed
- 1 large jalapeño pepper
- 1 small red onion (1/2 cut into large chunks, 1/2 thinly sliced)
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 3 cups shredded rotisserie chicken (skin removed)
- Juice of 2 limes, plus wedges for serving
- Kosher salt
- 2 cups chopped watermelon
- 11/2 cups fresh cilantro
- 3/4 cup crumbled Cotija cheese (about 3 ounces)
- Freshly ground pepper
- 12 corn tortillas
- 1 avocado, chopped

Heat a large cast-iron skillet over high heat. Add the tomatillos, jalapeño and red onion chunks. Cook, turning, until blistered, 5 to 6 minutes for the onion and 7 to 8 minutes for the tomatillos and jalapeño. Transfer to a cutting board; cool slightly. Chop the tomatillos and onion; seed and chop the jalapeño.

Heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a medium skillet over medium-high heat. Add the tomatillos, chopped onions and half of the jalapeño. Cook until the vegetables release their juices, then add the chicken, the juice of 1 lime and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Simmer until warmed through, about 2 minutes. Keep warm over low heat.

Toss the watermelon, 1/2 cup cilantro, the sliced red onion, the remaining jalapeño, juice of 1 lime, 1 tablespoon olive oil and half of the cheese in a bowl. Season with 1/4 teaspoon salt and a few grinds of pepper. Warm the tortillas in a dry skillet.

Add the remaining 1 cup cilantro to the chicken mixture. Divide among the tortillas; top with the watermelon salad, the remaining cheese and the avocado. Serve with lime wedges.
